Şeker Bayramı happens right after Ramadan and lasts for three days. Families come together to celebrate. They give presents and candies to children and stay away from restaurants. On the night before the festival, called Arife, you should book restaurant tables early because

they get crowded.

Kurban Bayramı (Festival of Sacrifice)

Kurban Bayramı is on the fourth day and is also known as the Festival of Sacrifice. People remember the story of Prophet Ibrahim and his son İshmael from the Quran. They show this by sacrificing a sheep, lamb, or goat.

Another thing I want to mention here, traveling during the Şeker and Kurban festivals can be hard. You should book your seats on trains or planes early. These festivals are very popular in Turkey. Also, many shops, banks, museums, and government offices close during these times. So, plan ahead to avoid any problems.
