Summer is long, from June to August and the temperature reaches over 100°F most of the time. If you do not like it hot, then you should better avoid these months. December to February is winter and the temperature might be a little low, but the overall atmosphere makes it a good time to visit.

How Many Days Should You Stay in Gaziantep Turkey?

Well, you might be asking yourself the question: How many days should I spend in Gaziantep? That, of course, depends on how far you are willing to go. That's why a tourism trip for 2-3 days will be more than enough to see the main attractions of Gaziantep, such as the Zeugma Mosaic Museum, Gaziantep Castle, and, of course, the best places to try delicious meals.

But if you want to get much deeper into the culture and spend more time with no haste, it is better to choose 4-5 days. This will give you more time to walk through the bazaars, try the local markets, and possibly even take a food tour – believe me, you will want to do that.

The longer your stay, the much better you are going to feel. Well, Gaziantep isn't the sort of place you can quickly run through—it's the sort of place you linger in, as over the world-renowned dishes.
